

Year Six Homework – 28/9/18

We've had another brilliant week! I have been so impressed with the children's amazing attitude to school and I am sure we're going to have a brilliant year.

In English, we have been looking at sentences with relative clauses and I'd like the children to practise writing some more of these for homework this week.

- Sentences with relative clauses, **which are really useful**, use commas to make space for an extra piece of information about the same subject.
- These sentences, **which are an ideal way to master the use of commas**, are going to be an important part of our work in English this year.
- Mr McKenna, **who teaches Year Six**, loves these sentences!

The sentences above are examples of these sentences. The relative clauses are in red. Note that the bits in black work as sentences by themselves.

In class we have referred to these sentences as "noun, which/where/who/when..." sentences as this is a useful way to remember their form.

The extra piece of information in the relative clause is often introduced using one of these words: **where, when, that, who, whom, whose, or which**.

I've encouraged the children to write these sentences by thinking of two pieces of information about the subject of the sentences and combining them using a relative clause.

The children should use this technique to write at least six sentences about some of the subjects below.

Remember to check for full stops and capital letters!
