# The Celts and The Romans



- Find out about Famous Roman locations in Britain and create a collage with pictures, drawing and captions explaining where these places are and what they were used for.
- Write a list of Celtic names (10—20). Did you recognise any of the names? Are they still used today?
- Find out about a famous Roman building in Rome. What was it used for? What did it look like? Does it still exist today?
- Make a list of objects that we use nowadays that the Romans also used or maybe even invented.
- Draw yourself as a Roman – you can be any type of Roman you like (e.g soldier, Emperor, gladiator).
- Draw yourself as a Celt – you can be any type of Celt you like (e.g. warrior, Chief, druid).
- Choose a times table and write it out using Roman numerals.
- Find out some Roman foods and use these to design a menu for a Roman café.
- Find images of Celtic artefacts in museums today. What items have survived from these times? What materials are they made from? Who would have owned them?

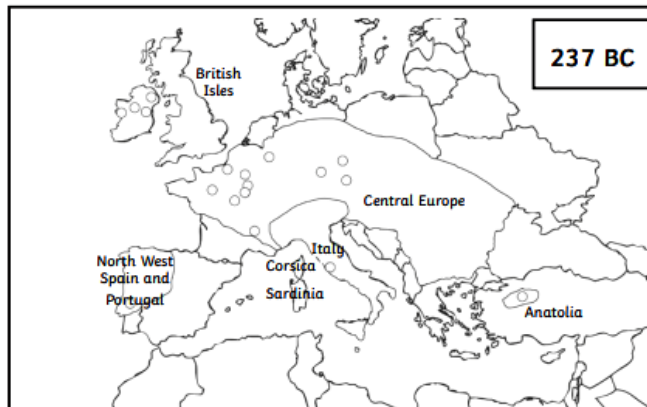

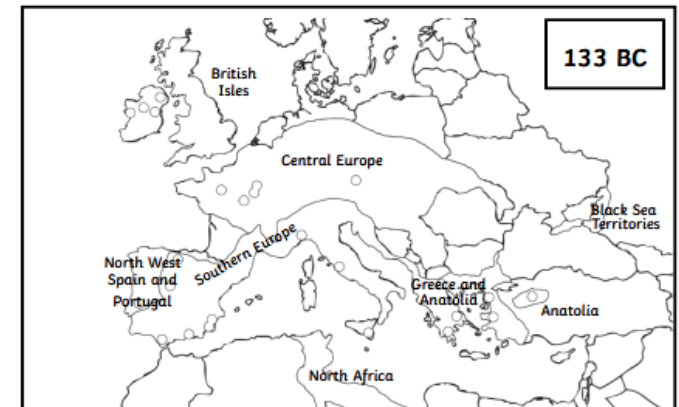

Colour in Southern Europe, North Africa, Greece and Anatolia and Black Sea Territories as Roman.



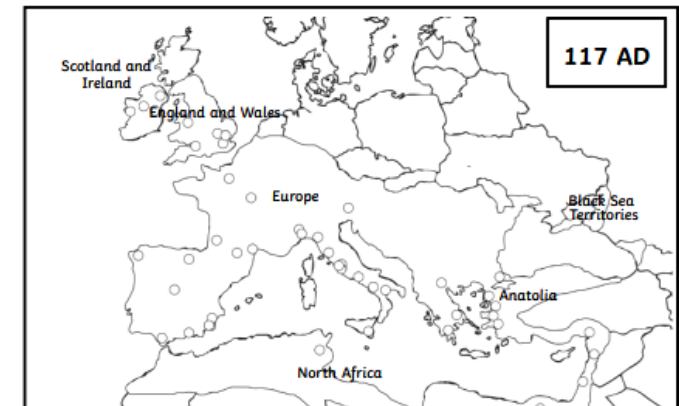
44 BC
