First humans arrive and settle in North America.

1142 CE

Early 1600s CE

European explorers sail to "The New World" and meet members of the tribes.

They live in peace, trading goods like fur.

Mid 1600s CE

The Beaver Wars

The Haudenosaunee fight against the settlers about the fur trading.

Fighting lasts for 60 years.

1783 CE

The United States of America is formed after a war of independence with Britain. Haudenosaunee tribes fight on both sides.

The Haudenosaunee that sided with the Britain settle in Canada.

The Haudenosaunee that sided with the America were forced to move west and placed in reservations.

the language, traditions, art and way of life of a particular group of people

Who were the Haudenosaunee?

- People lived in North America possibly as early as 15—30,000 years ago!
- The Haudenosaunee were a confederacy of tribes called The Six Nations.
- Haudenosaunee means "the people of the longhouse".

Disease and war



Many natives died in battles with settlers or from the diseases the settlers spread.



Natives who survived had their land taken by the settlers and were forced to live in small, unhygienic reservations.

- Families lived in a longhouse
- Fire pits for heating and cooking
- Doors at each end and no windows



Food

- 3 main crops: The Three Sisters
- Women farmed and cooked
- Men hunted for meat
